Two Canadians in prisoner swap freed for health reasons: China

TAIPEI, TAIWAN — China's Foreign Ministry said Monday that two Canadians detained in late 2019 who were allowed to return to Canada in a prisoner swap were released on bail for health reasons.

A ministry spokesperson made the comment as Beijing sought to downplay the connection between their release and the return to China of a long-detained executive of Huawei Technologies.

Canadians Michael Spavor and Michael Kovrig were detained in December 2019, days after Huawei's chief financial officer, Meng Wanzhou, was arrested in Canada at the request of U.S. authorities.

Many countries labeled China's action "strange politics," while China accused Canada of arbitrary detention. The two Canadians were jailed for more than 1,000 days.

Meng fought the U.S. demand for extradition from Canada. She landed in China on Saturday after reaching a deal with the U.S. Justice Department that led to a prisoner swap.

"The case of Meng Wanzhou is completely different from that of Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor in nature," Foreign Ministry spokesperson Fuu Chenyong said at a daily briefing on Monday.

The two men were suspected of endangering national security, Hua said.

Spavor, an entrepreneur, had been sentenced to 11 years in prison, accused of spying. Kovrig had not yet been sentenced but was facing similar charges.

China released the two Canadians on bail after a "diagnosis by



professional medical institutions, and with the guarantee of the Canadian ambassador to China," Hua said.

Hua did not answer questions from journalists about whether the prisoner releases were entirely unrelated and what the health reasons were.

Canada has maintained that Kovrig and Spavor were innocent of any charges.

"As we have said from the beginning, Michael Kovrig's and Michael Spavor's detention, and the treatment they were subjected to up until their departure from China, was arbitrary," Global Affairs Canada said in a statement. "These two men are innocent."

Meng reached an agreement with U.S. federal prosecutors that will drop fraud charges against her next year. In return, she is accepting responsibility for misrepresenting the company's business dealings in Iran.

U.S. White House press secretary Jen Psaki told reporters Monday that the decision to allow Meng to return to China was an independent law enforcement matter decided by the U.S. Justice Department. She added that President Joe Biden's administration has advocated for the release of the two Canadians but

U.S. President Joe Biden received his COVID-19 booster shot on Monday, days after federal regulators recommended a third dose of the Pfizer vaccine for Americans aged 65 or older and approved them for others with pre-existing medical conditions and high-risk work environments.

"The most important thing we need to do is get more people vaccinated," Biden said before getting the booster. He said he didn't have side-effects after his first or second shots.

Biden, 78, got his first shot on Dec. 21 and his second dose three weeks later, on Jan. 11, along with his wife, Jill Biden.

Speaking on Friday after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration authorized the Pfizer booster, Biden told reporters, "I'll be getting my booster shot. It's hard to acknowledge I'm over 65, but I'll be getting my booster shot."

Biden emerged as a champion of booster doses this summer, as the U.S. experienced a sharp rise in coronavirus cases from the more transmissible delta variant. While the vast majority of cases continue to occur among unvaccinated people, regulators pointed to evidence from Israel and early studies in the U.S. showing that protection against so-called breakthrough cases was vastly improved by a third dose of the Pfizer shot.

Biden said last week that the U.S. was purchasing another 500 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine — for a total of one billion over the coming year — to donate to less-well-off countries.

Vice President Kamala Harris, 56, received the Moderna vaccine, for which federal regulators have not yet authorized boosters — but they are expected to in the coming weeks. Regulators are also expecting data about the safety and efficacy of a booster for the single-dose Johnson & Johnson shot.

At least 2.66 million Americans have received booster doses of the Pfizer vaccine since mid-August, according to the CDC. About 100 million Americans have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 through the Pfizer shot. U.S. regulators

recommended getting the boosters at least six months after the second shot of the initial two-dose series.

On Capitol Hill, Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell, 79, a pollster, encouraged Americans to get vaccinated and revealed he had also received a booster dose Monday.

"I've been saying for months, these safe and effective vaccines are the way to defend ourselves and our families from this terrible virus," he said.

In Europe, President Emmanuel Macron on Saturday said France would give 120 million COVID-19 vaccine doses to poor countries, doubling an earlier pledge, French news agency AFP reported.

In the Americas, Cuba has begun commercial exports of its management COVID-19 vaccines, sending shipments of the three-dose Abdala vaccine to Vietnam and Venezuela. Cuban scientists have said the vaccines are more than 90 per cent effective against illness, though — like all vaccines — less so against mere infection.

The COVID-19 vaccine by Pfizer-BioNTech will be the only one used in Mexico for at-risk children aged 12 to 17, Mexico's deputy health minister said.

In the Asia-Pacific region, Japan plans to lift its COVID-19 state of emergency, which covers 19 prefectures, in all the regions at the end of September, broadcaster NHK reported on Monday. Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga said he discussed easing measures with relevant ministers on Monday and would seek the views of a government panel of advisers on Tuesday.

Thailand's COVID-19 task force approved a plan to procure a combined 3.35 million doses of the AstraZeneca and Pfizer-BioNTech vaccines, a spokesperson said. The country will also waive its mandatory quarantine requirements in Bangkok and nine regions beginning Nov. 1 to vaccinated arrivals, according to authorities.

In Africa, Tunisia will entirely lift its nightly curfew against COVID-19 beginning Saturday, the presidency said, after about a year in force.

Alberta health-care system sets another record with 312 patients in intensive care

Alberta has set yet another record for the number of patients requiring critical care as the health-care system buckles under the pressure of the pandemic's fourth wave.

There are currently 312 patients in intensive care units (ICUs), the vast majority of whom are COVID-19 positive, an Alberta Health Services (AHS) spokesperson said in a statement Monday morning.

AHS continues to open additional ICU spaces and redeploy staff to meet patient demand, including opening another 38 surge beds in the past week, the statement said.

During that same period, ICU patient numbers have increased by 11 percent, AHS said.

There are currently 370 ICU beds in Alberta, including 197 surge spaces. ICU capacity, including surge beds, is at 84 percent, AHS said.

AHS says the Calgary zone has 133 ICU beds, including 67 additional spaces. It is operating at 80 per cent of surge capacity.

In the Edmonton zone, there are



158 ICU beds, including 86 additional spaces. It is operating at 87 percent of surge capacity.

Alberta doctors miss warning A letter addressed to the public from the Alberta Medical Association's intensive care section paints a grim picture about the situation, it says.

"We remain on the verge of a health system collapse in Alberta," it reads.

Critical care units require a specialized workforce, but despite

additional staffing, there are insufficient numbers of these health-care workers to keep up with the increasing ICU patient numbers, the letter says. As a result, the number of patients assigned to each nurse has increased.

Dr. Sam van Diepen, a critical care physician who signed the letter, said in an interview Monday the system has run out of experienced people.

"We have fewer trained people than in previous waves. A lot of nurses

have left the profession - retired, left for mental health issues, burnout," he said.

"I don't think I can underestimate enough just how burnt out and tired people are at this point."

The letter warns that, in a worst-case scenario, triage protocols would be activated.

A 52-page critical care triage protocol developed by AHS describes how the health-care system would ration care if ICUs no longer have the resources to care for every critically ill patient.

"I think it's a realistic possibility given our current state," van Diepen said.

Another news release Monday from the entire Alberta Medical Association calls for the province to institute "significant and immediate" public health measures as a "fire-breaker" to aggressively control COVID-19 cases and protect the health-care system.

Alberta will report new COVID-19 case numbers from the weekend on Monday afternoon.

It has now been 11 days since Premier Jason Kenney first introduced a slew of new public health measures, and one week since many went into effect, including the restrictions on exemption program, which is Alberta's version of a vaccine passport system.

Alberta premier rejects call for COVID 'firebreak,' says new measures would punish the vaccinated

Alberta Premier Jason Kenney rejected calls for a "hard lockdown" during an appearance on a radio program Sunday, the same day that his province's former top doctor signed a letter calling for immediate "firebreak" measures to deal with surging cases of COVID-19.

Kenney told radio host Roy Green that a lockdown would make "no sense for the 80 per cent of the population that is vaccinated," who he said are much less likely to transmit the disease and are far less likely to be hospitalized.

He also said the roughly 20 per cent who aren't vaccinated and are behind the surge in cases are less likely to follow public health measures.

Dr. James Talbot, Alberta's former chief medical officer of health, co-wrote a letter to the province's new health minister, Jason Copping, strongly recommending additional measures in the province, as the pandemic's fourth wave continues to strain hospital capacity.

More than 82 per cent of eligible Albertans have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, and more than 75 per cent are fully immunized, but that represents only 62.4 per cent of the province's total population.

Talbot and Dr. Noel Gibney, a critical care specialist, made seven "urgent" recommendations in their letter, including the immediate transfer of ICU patients to other provinces in order to relieve pressure on hospitals and delay the need for triage protocols.

"They also called for a set of closures and restrictions for bars, gyms, casinos, indoor dining and sports facilities for a minimum of four weeks, as well as capacity limits on indoor spaces such as places of worship and post offices.

"My biggest concern is that ... this is just going to get worse," Talbot told CBC News Network on Sunday.

The other proposed measures include:

- That the government require proof of vaccination to access all non-essential services.
- That masks be mandated in schools, including when students



are seated in classrooms.

That contact tracing be done for positive COVID-19 tests.

That the government and related arm-length organizations (Alberta Blue Cross, WCB etc.) mandate vaccines for all employees and contractors.

That immunization of employees be mandated in essential and non-essential businesses.

The province is developing new approaches to try to increase vaccine uptake, including supporting pop-up clinics like this one in all health zones.

However, the number of still-unvaccinated people is large enough to be causing what Alberta hospitals are seeing right now, Talbot said. Vaccines are not available to children under 12.

"[People] are being denied things like chemotherapy, elective surgery and could eventually run into a triage protocol where worse things happen because of how clogged up the system is," he said.

"We still have tools available to stop the spread of the virus in the community, but the government is just choosing not to use them. They say they can't. The truth is, they won't."

In a statement to CBC News, Steve Buck, Copping's press secretary, said the health minister has "a clear mandate" from the premier to increase health system capacity, to educate vaccine-hesitant Albertans and increase vaccine coverage.

Canada's Green Party chief stepping down after election loss

The head of the Green Party of Canada, Annamie Paul, has announced that she is stepping down after failing to win a seat in last week's federal election and leading the party to disappointing overall results. Speaking to reporters on Monday, Paul - the first Black and Jewish woman to lead a federal party in Canada's history - said she was informed shortly after the September 20 vote that the Greens were launching a review of their leadership.



Canada's Trudeau's Liberals win minority government, CBC projects an uncertain election victory for Canada's Trudeau. "No one really wins" Canada vote results near identical to 2019. "I just asked myself whether this is something that I wanted to continue, whether I was going to continue to put up with the attacks I knew would be coming, whether to continue to have to fight and struggle just to fulfill my democratically elected role as leader of this party," she said.

"I just don't have the heart for it." Paul became the first Black woman to lead a federal party in Canada after beating out seven other candidates on October 3 last year, succeeding Elizabeth May, who led the Greens for 13 years. But she has for months been in a

Ontario adds more than 100 labour inspectors as NDP accuse government of 'walking away from business community'

NDP Leader Andrea Horwath is accusing the Ford government of "walking away from the business community" and leaving them to deal with the logistical complications around enforcing the new vaccine certificate system "on their own."

Horwath made the comment during a news conference outside Queen's Park on Monday morning. Her criticism comes as the Ministry of Labour adds more than 100 new health and safety inspectors who will largely be responsible for educating businesses on the new vaccine requirement. The ministry, however, has not yet made any additional funding available to businesses to help them cover the costs of enforcing the policy.

"I think it is pretty clear that the government has basically walked

away from the business community, particularly small businesses, and left them to deal with this on their own. There is just no doubt that small business is still suffering and we have asked many times for the government to put in place another round of small business supports which would have helped perhaps in allowing them to prepare for an implement these extra measures that they are now expected to undertake," Horwath said. "The government should have been much more prepared and should have provided a number of opportunities for tools, for communications, for recommendations around how restaurants should handle the certificate issuer that they did."

A number of groups have raised concerns about the fact that the vaccine certificate system will largely

September 20 election, in which she was trying to get elected in Canada's smallest and most densely populated constituency, Toronto-Centre. But the 46-year-old, who failed to win a by-election in that riding in late October 2020, ultimately finished fourth with only 8.5 percent support in last week's vote.

"When I was elected and put in this role, I was breaking a glass ceiling," Paul said on Monday.

"What I didn't realize at the time is that I was breaking a glass ceiling that was going to fall on my head and leave a lot of shards of glass that I was going to have to crawl over throughout my time as a leader."

She also called her time as party leader "the worst period" in her life.

The Greens - who campaigned on a promise to enact tough measures to tackle the climate crisis, a top priority for Canadians - had a disappointing showing in the recent election, winning only two seats in the 338-seat House of Commons - down from three in the last vote in 2019.

The party also only won 2.3 percent of the popular vote this time - a drop of four percentage points compared with two years ago.

have overwhelming confidence in the people of Ontario to treat one another with respect," he said. The City of Brampton continues to take significant steps revitalizing its downtown, with Brampton Committee of Council yesterday approving a \$16.6M investment in streetscaping work as part of the first phase of the City's Integrated Downtown Plan (IDP).

Downtown Brampton is undergoing a transformation as the City continues to rethink and reinvent public spaces to meet local needs, support economic recovery, create jobs, and build vibrant, resilient communities to improve quality of life for Brampton residents. In full coordination with the Region of Peel's downtown infrastructure work, the City will move forward with streetscaping initiatives that include replacing existing sidewalks with stone pavers and resurfacing roads with widened sidewalks on both sides of Queen and Main Streets. This approximately \$16.6 million investment will serve to create quality urban spaces for commercial activity, pedestrians and cyclists and form active linkages between Hobbsick and Pinkens Creeks, and create an enhanced pedestrian realm in the downtown core.

Staff is directed to develop a Downtown Brampton Streetscape Manual to complement the approval of the IDP, which will inform the diverse local neighbourhoods within downtown Brampton.
