Affordability in Canada is at a crisis point - and politicians don't have an easy fix

For Canadians like Missy Anderson, the cost of living is becoming a crisis. She's 58 years old, a mother of four, and lives in Burlington, Ont. Like many other Canadians she has been forced to make difficult choices about how to spend her money.

"It's a juggling act," she said in an interview on CBC's The House that aired Saturday. On top of the costs of feeding and caring for her children, a low-dose chemotherapy treatment to address Stage 1 cervical cancer presents another challenge for the 58-year-old.

Inflation in July was up 7.6 per cent in July over the same period last year. It was the first month-to-month decline since 2021, but the cost of living is still taking a bite out of Anderson's budget - and she's hoping sharply from politicians.

"They need to understand how the average Canadian is living. They offer benefits that I think they sound good - stuff like one-time \$500 help for rent," Anderson told host Catherine Callan.

"If you're in this area, that's not going to do a whole lot for help. That's like two trips to the grocery store."

Anderson is hoping for more help as soon as possible.

The federal government announced this week new measures that are aimed at helping with the affordability challenges, including the mental health benefit. Anderson describes, as well as boosted GST credits and a new dental benefit.

"These are things that will make a difference in people's lives right now, but they are insufficiently targeted that they will not contribute to increased inflation," said Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

Opposition Leader Pierre Poilievre, however, argued the plan would "pour gasoline on the fire" of inflation. Scotiabank head of capital markets economics Derek Holt also criticized the government for shelling out more spending.

No easy solutions for short term pain

Trevor Tombs, an economist at the University of Calgary, told The House it was unlikely the recently announced measures would have a significant effect.

But he noted it might be hard to address the root problem of inflation quickly, as one of the things governments need to be honest about is "recognizing clearly and explicitly that there's not a lot that can be done in the very short term," he said.

Much of inflation is caused by global factors and high energy prices, Tombs said, on which government policies around spending or transfers can have limited impact. Rate hikes from the Bank of Canada will also take time to have an effect on inflation, Tombs noted.

Sean Speer, a senior fellow at the Munk School of Global Affairs and former economic policy adviser to Stephen Harper agreed that long term planning was needed to comprehensively deal with major challenges facing Canada today.

"I don't think we've heard enough from the government either on short term things either to boost supply, but more important long term plans. There are just so many areas where we find ourselves supply constrained: health care, housing, energy," he said.

NDP claims victory on benefits announcement

Speer noted Poilievre was benefiting from being out in front of the inflation issue, and there may be a battle now brewing about the federal carbon tax.

"While the purpose of the carbon tax is to raise prices over time, there has been over the past 12 months or so such a significant increase on energy prices that it risks accelerating the increases intended by the carbon tax even faster," he said.

NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh told The House the new announcement - which he's touted as a major victory - will help ease costs for Canadians, by lowering the burden of dental costs while other prices remain high.

Citizens gathered in downtown Ottawa for the memorial parade involving members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Canadian Armed Forces.

The memorial parade, which followed the state funeral in London, next to Ottawa City Hall, at 12:10 p.m. The parade travelled north on Elgin Street past the National Aboriginal Veterans Monument and the National War Memorial, and then west on Wellington Street to Christ Church Cathedral.

As a result of the parade, a number of roads in the downtown core will be closed through the day to motor vehicle traffic, and no-stopping and no-parking restrictions are in effect.

Two mounted detachments of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, a 100-person Canadian Armed Forces quad-service guard of honour, the CAF Central Band and 17 honorary pallbearers marched in the parade. A 96-gun salute - one salvo for each year of Her Majesty's life - was conducted during the memorial parade from LeBreton Flats.

The commemorative ceremony at Christ Church Cathedral will begin at 1 p.m. The invitation-only service will include 600 guests, including members of Parliament, dignitaries and members of the diplomatic corps. Former prime minister Brian Mulroney and former governor general Adrienne Clarkson will deliver addresses during the ceremony.

The commemorative ceremony was to end with a flypast over Parliament Hill and Christ Church Cathedral by the Royal Canadian Air Force CF-18s, but the flypast was cancelled due to inclement weather.

Canada's real estate market has suddenly and dramatically cooled. Sales have dropped 24 per cent since this time last year. The average price of a home in this country has fallen by \$179,047 since the peak in February.

And yet, has much actually changed?

"I consider it like letting the air out of a balloon," said Colin Cieszyński, chief market strategist at SIA Wealth Management. "You don't want it necessarily to pop and burst, but in the near term prices needed to come down to something that was a little bit more sustainable."

For anyone trying to get into the market, the prospect of a cool down was always presented as an opportunity. But even with a 20 per cent drop in prices, Canada's average home price has fallen back to where it was in early 2021.

What has changed, however, is how house-poor the typical Canadian family is feeling lately. Statistics Canada says the drop in home prices has helped drive the largest decline of household wealth this country has ever seen.

Billions lost in household net worth

It may be easy to look at the decline in home prices and, if you're not an owner trying to sell, say, "That doesn't affect me."

But the reality is: Much of Canadian household wealth is tied up in home prices, the sector itself remains one of the biggest contributors to Canadian GDP, and it just took a hit.

Canadian households have lost billions in real estate cool-down

As values fall off and interest rates rise, homeowners are less likely to borrow and spend.

Those interest rates will also slow the economy in another way, says Kavvic.

"If your mortgage payment is gone up \$500 a month, or \$1000 a month, that is immediately biting into discretionary spending that you could otherwise be spending elsewhere in the economy," he told CBC News.

Inflation is not over

Meanwhile, inflation is eating into our purchasing power and eroding wage growth.

Combined, consumers are looking for ways to scale back spending, and small decisions make big differences when scaled out over a population.

"If you're not going out for lunch, well, that's one fewer sale at the local lunch place and maybe at some point, a couple fewer jobs," said Kavvic.

He expects there are difficult days ahead.

Next week, Canada's latest inflation numbers are set to be released. They're forecast to show a deceleration in the main, headline number that in June reached a 39-year high of 8.1 per cent.

Long COVID plan, funding decisions in the works, Ontario's top doctor says

Ontario is expected to make funding decisions for a long COVID strategy in the near future, the province's top doctor says, as health officials work to create standard definitions and treatment protocols.

Hospitals have been submitting proposals to Ontario Health, and now the province is working to provide guidance to primary care professionals on how to care for patients with long COVID symptoms, Chief Medical Officer of Health Dr. Kieran Moore said.

"I've seen the proposals and I don't want to pre-empt any ministry announcements, but I think they're about to make some funding decisions in the near future," Moore said in a recent interview.

Ontario's recently disbanded science table called earlier this month for a proactive and comprehensive strategy to deal with long COVID, which it said is likely to impart a significant burden on the province's population



and its health-care system.

"We're trying to create a standardization of how to define what long COVID is, what would be the major symptoms, whether they're neurologic, cardiac, or respiratory, that we'd like to have treatment protocols for," he said.

It's also important to understand what additional resources could help people with long COVID, such as rehabilitation, occupational health treatment and physiotherapy, he said.

"As well, we want to understand what laboratory investigations would be necessary to help with the diagnosis. What other diagnostic imaging would be important? What pulmonary function tests would be important?"

Randomized control trials lacking, doctor says
Ontario officials are looking at international literature, and Moore himself said he was just at a conference with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. That agency is also trying to define investigation and treatment pathways, he said.

"There haven't been a lot of randomized controlled trials to be able to give physicians guidance on what therapies work, in what instances," he said.

"So all of that work is evolving. We certainly want our researchers involved to ensure that we provide best guidance early on in the treatment pathways."

The Ministry of Health said earlier this month in response to the science table brief that it is reviewing the findings, but did not answer a question about whether or not the province has a plan for the condition.

Trudeau faces mounting pressure to meet UN Global Fund request

AIDS activists are pressuring the Trudeau government to renew its support for fighting infectious diseases abroad after an embarrassing Montreal conference that left the sector worried Canada will fall short.

On Wednesday, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau will attend a pledging conference for the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria in New York City.

Canada is one of the fund's largest supporters and has pledged \$4 billion since 2002.

Countries replenish the fund every three years, with their contributions usually rising over time as health-care systems build more capacity to treat and prevent these diseases.

In each cycle, civil society groups issue what they call a bid-share metric to reflect how much each wealthy country can reasonably pledge to help the fund reach its goals.

This spring, Canadian advocates called on Trudeau to commit \$1.2 billion.

Since then, the U.S., Germany and Japan have all announced finding that met requests from local groups.

Elise Legault, Canada director at the ONE Campaign, an international non-governmental organization that fights extreme poverty and preventable disease, said anything less than \$1.2 billion would lead to preventable deaths.

"Prime Minister Trudeau cannot shortchange the fight against AIDS, TB and malaria, because this is a



fight we can win," she said.

The fund supports developing countries in limiting and treating the three preventable illnesses, which in many regions are among the leading causes of death.

Trudeau has championed the fund in the past, including in 2016 when he spoke alongside Zimbabwean activist Loyce Maturu.

Maturu lost her mother and brother in 2003 to both AIDS and tuberculosis. She contracted both diseases and says Canada's contributions funded programs that brought her back from the brink of death. The 30-year-old now plans to have children.

"I would really like to thank the Canadian government for being a traditional donor within the Global Fund because it really has saved millions of lives, and I am one of the lives that has been saved," Maturu said from New York City, where she plans to press Trudeau to boost Canada's contribution.

The World Health Organization reported that tuberculosis deaths rose

in 2020 for the first time in more than a decade, as governments focused on containing the COVID-19 pandemic.

Malaria deaths follow a similar pattern, while HIV patients have reported disruptions to treatments that stop the virus from progressing to AIDS.

Maturu said those trends have survivors like her nervous about Canada's reluctance to announce its funding until the last minute.

"It's really hard, and we're just keeping our fingers crossed," she said.

Groups like the ONE Campaign called on the Liberals to reveal Canada's commitment at the international AIDS 2022 conference in Montreal in July.

The government did not make an announcement and International Development Minister Harjit Sajjan cancelled his appearance at the conference, with his office citing "operational issues."

Ottawa came under fire at the time for not issuing travel visas for HIV experts and advocates from African countries, leading some speakers to

accuse Canada of racism. The International AIDS Society said it would reconsider whether to hold any future conferences in Canada.

Sajjan's office said last Friday that another pledge for the Global Fund is coming, but would not provide any details.

"We will continue to support the Global Fund, which is Canada's largest investment in global health," wrote spokeswoman Haley Hodgson.

"Minister Sajjan recognizes how critical the Global Fund's Seventh Replenishment is for achieving our collective global goals to defeat HIV, tuberculosis and malaria."

During the fund's last pledging round in 2019, the Trudeau government increased its contribution after weeks of sustained pressure. At the time, Ottawa did not challenge rumours it would stick with the same amount of funding it had announced in 2016.

Legault said the fund has made "astounding progress" toward the UN sustainable development goal of ending the epidemic of HIV/AIDS by 2030.

According to UNAIDS, the joint United Nations program on HIV/AIDS, AIDS-related deaths have been reduced by 68 per cent since the peak in 2004, and by 52 per cent since 2010.

"Twenty years ago, the headlines on AIDS were dire; many African countries were so affected that life expectancy was on a downward trend because of the disease, with no end in sight," Legault said.

"The fight against HIV, tuberculosis and malaria is one of the great unsung success stories of the century."

Canadian dollar falls to lowest level in nearly 2 years amid possible global recession

The value of the loonie fell to its lowest point in nearly two years this week, adding further pressure on Canadians already squeezed by high inflation and the possibility of a global recession.

The Canadian dollar traded for 75.27 cents U.S. on Friday, falling at one point to nearly two-year low of 75.15 cents U.S. earlier in the day.

Meanwhile, the World Bank warned on Thursday that countries could head toward a global recession in 2023 as central banks simultaneously hike interest rates in

response to inflation - potentially resulting in lasting harm to emerging market and developing economies.

"It's going to be more expensive to buy stuff and your dollar isn't going to go as far," Lydia Miljan, a professor of political science at the University of Windsor, told CTV National News.

"The cost of borrowing is higher and so obviously that is going to put in some recessionary pressures."

Importers will feel the pain of a weaker Canadian dollar more acutely compared to exporters who would

receive a boost by selling their products in U.S. currency, she said.

What is different this time, Miljan adds, is the possibility of a recession at the same time as high inflation.

She says any financial planner would advise to hold off on any major purchases and start paying off debts as interest rates go up.

"Recessions don't have to last a long time, but this, coupled with all the other problems we had this year, I think is the last thing that Canadians want to see again," she said.

The Bank of Canada this month

raised its key interest rate to 3.25 per cent, one of a number of hikes it has already made this year as part of a strategy also employed by other central banks to slow inflation.

Analysts say the American dollar is normally seen as a safe haven during times of volatility, with investors parking their money in U.S. bonds, which in turn drives up the currency's value.

Russia's war in Ukraine has continued to have an impact on the global economy, as well.

The low value of the Canadian dollar also may affect food prices, which have also reached high due to inflation.

"We do import a lot of food from abroad during the winter to feed ourselves and if the loonie drops even further, it will impact the buying power of our importers," Sylvain Charlebois, director of Dalhousie University's Agri-Food Analytics Lab, told CTV National News.

Pak vs Eng: Timely T20 series to help contenders evaluate World Cup preparations

England will kick off their first tour of Pakistan in 17 years on Tuesday with the first of a seven-match Twenty20 series, which assures even more importance for both sides ahead of the World Cup in Australia next month.

England were initially scheduled to tour Pakistan last year but it did not materialise because of security concerns. Jos Buttler's men were only given the green light to tour this year after a security team evaluated the situation on the ground.

England will play four matches in Karachi and three in Lahore before returning in December to play three tests in the second leg of the tour.

With Buttler set to miss the Karachi leg as he recovers from a knee injury, the side will be led by Moeen Ali, whose grand father came to England from Pakistan after the second World War.

'It is going to be memorable playing in front of the Pakistani crowds and also an immense honour to deputise for Jos Buttler, while he



recovers from injury, and captain England.' Moeen wrote in his column for the Daily Mail.

'Of course, this tour is important for cricket and it is also crucial for us as a side.

'Seven T20s will be a stern test in these conditions and a good pointer for where we are, ahead of the World Cup in Australia next month,' added the all-rounder.

England last toured Pakistan in 2005 but at least 10 members of the current squad have some experience of local conditions courtesy of their Pakistan Super League (PSL) stints.

One of them, Alex Hales, will be particularly keen to impress after his three-year absence from international cricket due to an off-field issue.

Pakistan, meanwhile, will look to shrug off the disappointment of losing to Sri Lanka in the Asia Cup final earlier this month.

Australian coaches may give Pakistan slight advantage in World Cup

KARACHI: Australian representation in Pakistan's dressing room may give them a 'slight advantage' over their opponents during the upcoming T20 World Cup. Under the national side's bowling coach Shaun Tait has said.

Tait will be joined by compatriot and former international team-mate Matthew Hayden in Pakistan's backroom staff with the opener appointed as the team's mentor for the tournament in Australia.

The conditions in the country, however, will not be unfamiliar for the Pakistan players in an era where they play leagues around the world.

'It sounds like it's going to be more of an advantage of what it actually probably is,' Tait told reporters on Sunday.

'Players have played all around the world, they have played in Australia before, but I guess the discussion with the players will be a lot more positive, a lot more easier to talk to because we have played there and that's our home so I'd say may be a slight advantage.'

'I suppose we can give them a bit more confidence because you've got a couple of Australian guys in the dressing room and if that helps then great.'

Tait was brought into the Pakistan coaching setup during the team's Test series against Australia at home earlier this year.

Since then, a group of genuine fast-bowlers have been identified as the national side's pace battery, spearheaded by left-arm seamer Shaheen Shah Afridi, who is nursing a knee-injury since July.

In Shaheen's absence, right-armers Naseem Shah and Haris Rauf have shown on top of their game and they showed it during the recently-concluded Asia Cup.

There were decent performances from Mohammad Hasnain and Shabazwasi Dhanani as well. Tait said he was coaching Pakistan paces 'simple'.

Asian champions Sri Lanka to part ways with Tom Moody month away from World T20

Australian former international cricketer Tom Moody is set to leave his post as Sri Lanka's director of cricket, officials said on Monday, weeks before the T20 World Cup.

The 56-year-old's three-year contract is being terminated by 'mutual agreement', Mohan de Silva, secretary of Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC), told AFP.

A senior cricket source who did not wish to be named said that SLC 'could not afford his fee in the long run', despite having savings of over \$40 million.

'We also feel we need a person who is more hands-on, who can spend more time in Sri Lanka,' the source added.

The source said that the former Test player was paid \$1,850 a day plus expenses for the 100 days a year he was expected to spend in the country, which is suffering its worst economic downturn.

Moody will leave by the end of this

Former PM Stephen Harper invested into Order of Canada in London

If Shakespeare thought misery acquaints people with strange bedfellows, he may well agree that mourning a cherished monarch may also bridge some political divides.

At least temporarily. Such was the case Sunday in London, when former prime minister Stephen Harper was invested into the Order of Canada while three of his previous political enemies looked on.

Harper is one of four former prime ministers in the British capital for the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II.

He was awarded the Companion of the Order of Canada in 2019, but an investiture ceremony had not taken place because of COVID-19.

So Gov. Gen. Mary Simon invested Harper in a private ceremony in London Sunday afternoon while Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, and former prime ministers Jean Chrétien, Paul Martin and Kim Campbell looked on.

"As we gather to celebrate (the Queen), I was honoured to be



invested into the Order of Canada by @GOCCanada Mary Simon, Harper said, in a tweet posted about the event.

"Thank you to @CanadianPM Trudeau, former federal Prime Minister Martin, Chrétien, Campbell & former Governors General Johnston & Jean for attending the ceremony."

Former governors general David Johnston, whom Harper appointed, and Michelle Jean, were also in attendance. The bad political blood between Harper and Trudeau in particular is well-documented, but the two posed side by side for photos after the ceremony.

Having multiple former prime ministers and governors general attend a world funeral together is not unprecedented in Canada.

While Harper was prime minister in 2013, Chrétien, Campbell, Jean, former governor general Adrienne Clarkson and former prime minister Brian Mulroney flew with him to South Africa for the funeral of Nelson

Mandela. In her own tweet last week, Harper's wife, Laureen Toskey Harper responded to a journalist who suggested the flight to London would be interesting with all the political actors at the same place.

"Interesting," she queried. "Very interesting if past trips are a reference. Lots of laughter, stories and I am sure this time, reminiscing about the Queen. These sort of trips are always wonderful to be part of."

Chrétien spoke briefly to media Sunday and was asked about being around all the other Canadian leaders.

"So many together and no fight," he said laughing. "So that's good."

He said there aren't very many occasions for this kind of gathering.

"We know each other, went through the same struggles," he said. "We fought against each other. Just like when we play hockey, we can be tough on the ice, then we go and have a beer after the game."

Order of Canada ceremonies are not normally held in secret, but Rideau Hall and the Prime Minister's Office chose not to tell media travelling with the delegation about either Harper's event Sunday or a similar one Saturday that saw actress Sandra Oh and Olympic swimmer Mark Tewksbury invested into the Order. No explanation for the secrecy has yet been offered.

Most economists agree with that timeframe or think it could happen sooner.

Safer opioid supply program leads to drop in Ontario hospitalizations, ER visits: study

TORONTO - Safer opioid supply programs can significantly cut down on emergency department visits and hospitalizations for people at high risk for overdose, new research from Ontario suggests.

A study published Monday in the Canadian Medical Association Journal examined people who used a safer opioid supply program in London, Ont., for just over three years, and found ER visits and hospital admissions had declined one year after participants entered the program.

The study also found no increased risk of infections or overdoses and a decline in health-care costs unrelated to primary care or outpatient medications after a year.

Lead author Tara Gomes, an epidemiologist at Unity Health in Toronto, says the study indicates the London safer opioid supply program is "very safe" and a model that should be applied more broadly to expand harm-reduction options for those at high risk of overdose.

"We found no opioid-related deaths among people who were part of this program in the year after they entered the program," said Gomes.

"I think it really provides some helpful evidence that these programs can not only be beneficial to people, in terms of just broadly improving their health, but it can also be very safe for them."

Safer opioid supply programs prescribe pharmaceutical opioids to those at high risk of overdose, as an alternative to an unregulated drug supply.

Researchers behind the study used data from ICES - a non-profit organization based in Toronto that captures, records and anonymizes health records for every doctor or hospital visit in Ontario.

They worked with the London Insite Community Health Centre, which launched safer opioid supply program in 2016, using information about enrolments between January 2016 and March 2019 to evaluate the program's effect on health-care system costs.

The researchers focused on the five years before clients entered the safer supply program and the year after, using a method called time-series analysis to see what clients' life patterns would likely have been had



Gomes said that approach allowed researchers to evaluate the impact of the London program and how access to a safer drug supply changed predicted outcomes for clients.

She said the study contained two main limitations, the first being that the London health centre combines a safer drug supply site with other health and social services for clients. She says this suggests the program was particularly effective when combined with other types of services.

"What we need to know is, as we look at other safer supply programs that are rolling out, what kinds of services do they provide and do they also have these wraparound services that can be beneficial as well? And can we also evaluate different models that are out there to see what maybe works better?" she said.

Gomes added another limitation of the study was a dearth of information on diversion, saying there are some concerns that people might share drugs from the safer supply with others rather than using them themselves.

"We can't capture that in the data," said Gomes. "But what we can say is that most of the time, that sharing of their supply is because (clients) are trying to help support their friends, family or people in their community to have access to a known substance that they're accessing through safer supply. And so it's really more indicative of the fact that there just isn't enough safer supply programming out there to support the needs of people."

The study found more than 29,000 people died in Canada from opioid-related toxicity between January 2016 and December 2021.

According to the federal government, there was a 96 per cent increase in apparent opioid toxicity

Student dies following Monday's shooting at auto body shop in Milton

Another victim in Monday's shooting at an auto body shop in Milton has died, Halton Regional Police say.

Satwinder Singh, 28, an international student from India, died in Hamilton General Hospital, police said in a news release on Saturday. Singh was working part-time at MK Auto Repairs at the time of shooting.

His family and friends were by his side, police added.

"This is heartbreaking news for our community which hasn't even begun to heal from Monday's traumatic events," Halton Regional Police Service Chief Stephen Tenner said in the release.

"I urge everyone to reach out and ask for help if they need it."

MK Auto Repairs owner Shaheel Ashraf, 38, was also killed in Monday's shooting.

Police said they are expressing "heartfelt condolences" to the family and friends of the victims, and the communities impacted by "this heinous tragedy."

The shooting rampage started in Mississauga, where Toronto Police Const. Andrew Hong, 48, was killed, and continued in Milton. Two other people were injured in the rampage.

Investigators have identified Sean Petrie, 40, as the suspect in all the shootings. Police later shot Petrie dead in a Hamilton Cemetery, according to Ontario's Special Investigations Unit.

Canada's rising prices becoming entrenched, recession may be needed: economists

The underlying pressures driving inflation in Canada are likely to peak in the fourth quarter of this year, economists told Reuters, though most see signs that rising prices are becoming entrenched and a recession may be needed to avoid a spiral.

Canada's inflation data for August will be released on Tuesday, with analysts forecasting the headline rate will edge down to 7.3 per cent, from 7.6 per cent in July and a four-decade high of 8.1 per cent in June.

But all eyes will be on the three core measures of inflation - CPI Common, CPI Median and CPI Trim - which taken together are seen as a better indicator of underlying price pressures.

The average of the three hits a record high of 5.3 per cent in July.

Six of eight economists surveyed by Reuters see core inflation peaking in the fourth quarter underlying domestic and global pressures start to

The broadening of price increases, increased wage settlements, as well as rising consumer and business inflation expectations are signs that inflation is becoming more entrenched in the economy, economists told Reuters. Six of eight said they see signs of entrenchment.

That is an outcome that the Bank of Canada has hoped to avoid, saying it would require more aggressive interest rate hikes to bring inflation back under control.
