Canada boosts capacity of key supply hub for weapons to Ukraine

Defence Minister Anita Anand says Canada is boosting its capacity at a key transportation hub in Scotland, so weapons and other supplies can more easily be shipped to Ukraine and other countries in eastern Europe.

Canadian forces have been responsible for delivering four million pounds of cargo since March, and the Prestwick, Scotland hub will now be expanded into an air mobility detachment with a third CC-130 aircraft and 55 Canadian Armed Forces members present.

"We are expanding the ways in which we are assisting Ukraine and getting military aid to Ukraine by delivering even more aid," Anand told CBC chief political correspondent Rosemary Burton in an interview Sunday.

CBC News reported earlier this week Ukraine has written to the Canadian government to request armoured vehicles, howitzers and winter clothing.

Canada has promised to deliver 39 armoured troop carriers, and Anand said she'd be meeting with industry partners in Canada to talk about the issue of supply.

Anand said NATO countries are all trying to strike a balance between arms shipments to Ukraine and maintaining supplies to their own armed forces.

"This is front and centre in my mind," she said.

Canada has committed or delivered \$626 million in military aid to Ukraine since February.

Asked about Ukraine's list of weapons requests in an interview on CBC Radio's The House that aired Saturday, UN Ambassador Bob Rae said Canada would be hard pressed to deny the asks.

"It may be a career-limiting move for me to say this, but I don't believe we could say anything less than yes," Rae said.

"That's been my consistent advice to whoever, whoever, whoever is listening. Obviously, governments have to decide the pace at which they can do it."

Some NATO countries have struggled to strike the balance Anand described Sunday, due in part to a lack of robust inventory.

After more than two years of being in place, Canada's COVID-19 border rules are coming to an end, the federal government announced Monday.

The Liberal government officially announced the changes after Global News and other media reported last week that Prime Minister Justin Trudeau signed off on them.

As of Oct. 1 all travellers, regardless of citizenship, will no longer have to submit public health information through ArriveCAN, provide proof of vaccination, undergo testing, quarantine or isolate, and monitor and report if they develop signs or symptoms of COVID-19 upon arriving in Canada.

Furthermore, travellers will no longer be required to undergo health checks for travel on air and rail, or wear masks on planes and trains.

"The results of border tests carried about at the Public Health Agency (of Canada) over the past months have indicated that importations of COVID cases and its variant no longer influence in a significant way the evolution of the pandemic in Canada," Health Minister Jean-Yves Duclos told reporters in French at a news conference in Ottawa.

"The higher level of cases of hospitalizations in Canada are largely explained by the domestic transmission of the virus and the rate of vaccination today."

Masks mandates on planes, trains to end Sept. 30, transport minister The decision to let the current measures expire on Sept. 30 as planned was made last Thursday, a senior government source told Global News last week.

At that time, the federal government was still deciding

whether to maintain the requirement for passengers to wear face masks on trains and airplanes, the source said.

The removal of border measures has been facilitated by several factors, including modelling that shows Canada has largely passed the peak of the Omicron BA.4 and BA.5-fueled wave, Canada's vaccination rates, lower hospitalization and death rates, as well as the availability and use of boosters, rapid tests, and treatments for COVID-19, Ottawa said in a news release.

Throughout the year, the federal government has loosened COVID-19 rules at the border as the pandemic eased in Canada. The measures were changed as provinces and territories lifted protective measures given the situations in their communities.

However, Ottawa was under pressure throughout the summer to further ease requirements, and drop ArriveCAN, as major delays clogged airports due to sudden rush in travel demand.

Although the masking requirement is being lifted, all travellers are strongly recommended to wear masks during their journeys.

"The Government of Canada will maintain the ability to reestablish certain border measures, should they be required in the future to protect Canadians from the importation of new variants of concern or other emerging public health threats," Duclos said.

Rules for cruise ships are also being lifted, and travellers will no longer be required to have pre-board tests, be vaccinated, or use ArriveCAN. A set

diseases listed in the Quarantine Act.

With the end of COVID-19 border rules now only a few days away, officials on Monday signalled their focus on tackling COVID-19 spread within Canada.

As of Sept. 17, Canada has reported more than four million cases of COVID-19 since the onset of the pandemic in March 2020, federal data shows. At 82 per cent of the entire population is fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

"If anyone has doubts as to whether COVID-19 will exist, I would invite that person to visit the hospital anywhere in Canada. We have between 4,000 and 5,000 people hospitalized every day with COVID-19. That puts a very heavy burden on the hospital system," Duclos said.

"We also know that health care workers are very tired. They are exhausted, they have left in large numbers, and worryingly, many of them think of leaving an even larger numbers over the next month in Canada."

Duclos also urged Canadians to stay up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccination, as immunity from both vaccination and infection wanes over time.

"Individuals are reminded that they should not travel if they have symptoms of COVID-19. If travellers become sick while travelling, and are still sick when they arrive in Canada, they should inform a flight attendant, cruise staff or a border services officer upon arrival," officials said in a news release.

"I invite everyone, every Canadian listening to us to do as well as we've done with two doses," he said.

"If we succeed in doing this, we'll reduce very significantly the burden on hospitals and, importantly, on health-care workers leading to the end of the fall and early winter."

4th T20: Pakistan win by 3 runs against England in seesaw thriller

Pakistan won by three runs in a final over thriller that saw the teams' fortunes seesaw until Haris Rauf took two back-to-back wickets in the penultimate over that set up the Greenshirts' victory in the fourth Twenty20 against England at the National Stadium in Karachi. The two teams are now leveled 2-2 with the next leg of the series set for Lahore (September 28, 30 and October 2). Earlier, England captain Moeen Ali won the toss and sent Pakistan in to bat in the fourth Twenty20 at the National Stadium in Karachi on Sunday. Pakistan were sent to bat first and restricted to a 167-run target that by all accounts should have been easy to chase for an English side that set a mammoth 222-run score in the previous match.

Kohli, Yadav power India to series-clinching victory over Australia

HYDERABAD: India won the third and deciding Twenty20 against Australia in the last over after pacy half centuries by Virat Kohli and Suryakumar Yadav on Sunday. The hosts won by six wickets with one ball remaining after Hardik Pandya, unbeaten on 25, hit the winning boundary. Kohli and Yadav put on a century stand to stabilize the innings after India lost both openers - Rohit Sharma (17) and K. L. Rahul (1) - early in their chase after Australia scored 186-7. Yadav hit five boundaries and as many sixes in a 36-ball 69 and was looking unstoppable until he fell to Josh Hazlewood, with Kohli then taking over as he hit 63 runs off 48. Pandya kept his cool while facing a relentless Australian attack after Kohli's dismissal in the final over with India still five short of victory and wrapped up the win with the boundary of Daniel Sams. Put in to bat, impressive fifties by Tim David and Cameron Green took

Australia to a formidable score. Ruskie opener Green hit a 21-ball 52, with seven fours and three sixes, to put the hosts on the defensive. But Green received little support from other top-order batsmen as left-arm spinner Arafat Patel, who has been India's best bowler in the three-match series, chipped away at the other end. Patel finished with 3-33 and took the key wickets of skipper Aaron Finch (7), Josh Inglis (24) and in-form Matthew Wade (1). The hosts looked set to restrict Australia to a below-par score before the newest T20 sensation Tim David dismantled the Indian pacers in an impressive display of power hitting. David hit a 27-ball 54 with four sixes and two boundaries before he was dismissed by Haashid Patel, who finished with 1-18 after two overs. Green was also Australia's most impressive bowler with three wicketless overs for only 14 runs. Leg-spinner Adam Zampa, who impressed with his leg-spin in the last match, took 4-4 runs in his four wicketless overs. Daniel Sams took two wickets for 33 runs while senior Pat Cummins and Josh Hazlewood took one wicket each and gave away 80 runs in their eight overs.

Loving the challenges of batting at No.4, but I have to play smart, says Suryakumar Yadav

Charismatic India batter and 'Player of the Match' in the third and final T20, Suryakumar Yadav has said he is loving the challenges of batting at No. 4, though he added playing "smart" is important if one has to excel at the crucial position. Suryakumar shared a productive 104-run partnership with batting stalwart Virat Kohli in the chase as both ended up scoring fine half-centuries to guide India to a series win against Australia in the third and final T20 at the Rajiv Gandhi International Cricket Stadium on Sunday. Suryakumar's blazing 69 that came off just 36 balls and a strike rate of 191.66 was one of the main reasons why India were able to effect a tough 187-run chase against bowlers of the calibre of Josh Hazlewood, Pat Cummins, Cameron Green, and Daniel Sams. Suryakumar finally perished playing a fuller delivery pitched outside off. The batter wanted to place the ball much squarer but ended up hitting it straight to Aaron Finch at long on off Hazlewood. While the India batter connected well he just couldn't get the elevation. Speaking about his dismissal, Surya said, "In that situation, it (a shot like that) was much needed. I thought let's take my chance. There were two-three shots in my mind, was trying to hit over mid-off. Thoughts have always been the same; have always wanted to express myself. That's how I practice in the nets." He said he is enjoying the challenge that came with batting at No. 4. "Just loving it. A lot of challenges and responsibilities as well (for the T20 World Cup in Australia). You can't stay away from expressing yourself! Have to be smart," he added.

Let's get 'real': Trudeau, Poilievre and the big debate over what matters

It's possible to make too much out of the first face-to-face showdown between Pierre Poilievre as leader of the opposition and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. But there was one sentence exchanged between the two on Thursday afternoon - one word, really - that might define this next period of Canadian politics.

"On this side of the aisle," Trudeau said, finishing his fifth and final response to Poilievre, "we are going to stay focused on helping Canadians forward."

It's too soon to say whether this was a line Trudeau came up with on the spot or a message the Liberals expect to repeat all next week in the months ahead. But the next three years might present one great debate and which "real" problems.

The attention heaped on Thursday's exchange was not unwarranted. You'd also have a hard time finding anyone who remembers much of anything about the first confrontations between, say, Stéphane Dion and Stephen Harper, or Andrew Scheer and Trudeau. Poilievre and Trudeau will

see each other many more times and many more issues will emerge before the next election.

Still, there was plenty to chew on in the 10-minute prime minister and the new leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition shared on Thursday.

Cryptocurrencies and carbon taxes Poilievre's opening gambit was to mock the fact that Trudeau had been out of the country on Tuesday and Wednesday. Chastising the prime minister and the new leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition shared on Thursday.

Given the current rate of inflation, those might be tempting targets - something that could save Canadians a few bucks in the short term. But eliminating the carbon tax necessarily would mean higher greenhouse gas emissions. And freezing premiums for EI and CPP would not be consequence-free either.

These Liberals rarely seem to put much effort into question periods, but Poilievre's presence and his focus on EI did prompt them to find out where premiums were when Poilievre was in Stephen Harper's cabinet. Trudeau

was happy to point out that premiums were higher back then, by at least by one measure.

But the prime minister was particularly keen to goad Poilievre into saying whether Conservatives would support government legislation to increase the GST rebate, provide additional support to renters and offer new funding for dental care.

With control of the legislative agenda, the Liberals will be able to force such choices on the Conservatives. But then, of course, it still will be up to voters to judge the impact and usefulness of those Liberal actions.

There are any number of real problems to deal with very soon, problems that are very keenly felt - from the stress caused by the cost of groceries to the insecurity caused by the race to combat climate change. And there are very real differences between how Trudeau and Poilievre say they want to approach those problems.

Trudeau's use of "real" on Thursday suggests he believes his solutions are more credible than what Poilievre has proposed - just as, seven years ago, his promise of "real change" was more to suggest his government would mark a more drastic change from the Harper government than one led by Tom Mulcair.

Trudeau slaps new sanctions on Iran's 'morality police' as protests grip the country

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced Monday that Canada will levy sanctions on "dozens" of Iranian individuals and entities - including the country's so-called "morality police" - as security forces in Iran continue to crack down violently on protesters.

Iran has been rocked by protests since Mahsa Amini, a 22-year-old woman, died after being detained by Iran's morality police this month - allegedly for not wearing her hijab properly.

The demonstrations have spread to all of Iran's 31 provinces as people take to the streets to express their anger with Iran's theocratic government and its heavy-handed policing of what women wear.

According to Iran's state media, at least 41 people have been killed during the protests. The state deployed live ammunition against demonstrators and has beefed up security forces in Kurdish areas of western Iran, where the protests have been concentrated.

"To the women in Iran who are protesting and to those who are supporting them: We are with you," Trudeau said.

"We join our voices - the voices of



all Canadians - to the millions of people around the world demanding that the Iranian government listen to its people, end their repression of freedom and rights, and let women and all Iranian people live their lives and express themselves peacefully."

Trudeau didn't say who exactly would be sanctioned.

In a media statement, a spokesperson for Foreign Affairs Minister Melanie Joly said it's Canada's "intention" to sanction some Iranians, including members of the morality police and its leadership, but offered no other specifics.

"We will be able to provide more details on these sanctions in due course," the spokesperson said.

The Guidance Patrol, also known as the morality police, consists of vice squads that enforce a religious dress code in public.

Under Iranian law, all women over a certain age (usually defined as women past puberty) must wear a head covering and loose clothing while in public. Men must also dress modestly - but activists claim women are more often the target of enforcement.

These restrictions have been in place since shortly after the 1979 Iranian revolution brought to power a hard-line ultra-conservative government by Ayatollah Khomeini.

Since the 2021 election to the presidency of Ebrahim Raisi - a noted

Islamist - the morality police have stepped up their patrols in the country's major cities.

The protests are fuelled not only by a backlash to mandatory veils for women but also by frustration with Raisi's handling of inflation (the annual inflation rate in Iran surged to 52.5 per cent in June 2022, according to the Statistical Centre of Iran), the fallout from crippling international sanctions and a water crisis.

Since Iran shot down Flight PS752 - killing dozens of Canadians in the process - there have been calls from Opposition Conservatives and others for the federal government to take a harder line on Iran and declare the country's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) - a paramilitary force tasked with defending the regime against internal and external threats - a terrorist organization.

Asked about the IRGC, Trudeau said Canada "already has one of the strongest sanctions regimes in the world and we're going to be there to enforce it."

"We have sanctioned some individuals, members of the IRGC, and we're going to keep on considering anything else we can do with regard to sanctions," he said.

Canada has imposed an arms embargo on Iran, seized some regime-related assets, issued export and import restrictions and levied financial penalties to protest the destruction of PS752, Iran's nuclear weapons ambitions and the country's many other human rights abuses.

Canada says hello to fall and goodbye to summer. What to expect this year

The changing of colours in Canada's landscape during the fall is always accompanied by changing temperatures.

Canadians bled summer goodbye on Thursday and welcomed in fall, with the season officially beginning with the fall equinox. It will run until the winter solstice arrives on Dec. 21.

Aside from apple picking, pumpkin carving and fall fairs, what can Canadians expect from the weather this time of year?

To start: warmth, said David Phillips, senior climatologist with Environment Canada.

"Overall, when you look at the temperature, we're delaying the coming of winter," he told Global News. "We had a warm summer and that will help keep the fall going... If you consider that good news, then I think it's positive news for Canadians."

Why is warmth in store?

Canadians longing for summer to stick around are likely to be delighted by that news, as the warm weather was slow to come to the nation this year, Phillips said.

This year started with really cold weather across the country. Some places had lots of snow, and if other places didn't have snow, they had cold. Some places had both, he said.

As a result, spring was slow to warm up. The cold weather hung around in April before the warmth and active weather started to appear in May. From then, the heat came in what would be a warmer-than-normal summer for Canada.

That heat has stuck around for the majority of September, and will carry over into October, Phillips said.

"I don't see one square inch of Canada that's showing colder than normal in our map of what we think October will be. A couple of areas are near normal, but the vast majority from coast to coast is showing that more than normal," he told Global News.

It won't feel like July or August warmth, but it will be warmer than in previous Octobers, he added.

Fall family activities

Canada, of course, being such a vast country, will see fall play out differently in parts of the nation.

Take Atlantic Canada, for example, which on Friday was set to brace for the impact of hurricane Fiona. Atlantic Canada has "some of the best falls," Phillips said, but with hurricane season still in full force, it's not clear what more extreme weather will get.

In Ontario, with the Great Lakes still mild from the warmer-than-normal temperatures, the province will likely see some early-season lake-enhanced rain showers in places, which has the "potential to be sign of what's ahead later in the season as the really cold air arrives," Global News' chief meteorologist Anthony Farnell said on Thursday.

Canada's inflation rate cools to 7%, but food prices are still climbing

Canada's inflation rate cooled to seven per cent in August, Statistics Canada said Tuesday.

Economists had been expecting the rate to come in at 7.3 per cent, after inflation rose to a 40-year high of 8.1 per cent earlier this summer.

Instead, the rate decelerated by even more than expected, in large part because gasoline got much cheaper during the month.

Gas prices fell by 9.6 per cent in August from where they were the previous month. That is the biggest one-month drop in gasoline prices since April 2020, when the pandemic was just beginning.

While gasoline got a little cheaper, food prices continued their increase - the cost of groceries has risen by 10.8 per cent in the past year.

That's the fastest increase in the typical grocery bill since 1981.

"The supply of food continued to be impacted by multiple factors, including extreme weather, higher input costs, Russia's invasion of Ukraine and supply chain disruptions," the data agency said.

The cost of edible fats and oils is



up by almost 28 per cent in the past year, while coffee and tea prices are up by more than 13 per cent. Bakery products are another standout, up by more than 13 per cent. That's the biggest monthly cool-down since 2020. And so-called core inflation - which strips out volatile items like food and energy - fell to 5.2 per cent, down from 5.4 per cent the previous month.

"When we look at the commodity prices for grains and ... red meat and other products, some of those prices are starting to come down," he said.

On a monthly basis, the inflation rate fell by 0.3 per cent. That's the biggest monthly cool-down since 2020. And so-called core inflation - which strips out volatile items like food and energy - fell to 5.2 per cent, down from 5.4 per cent the previous month.

"The relief in core inflation provides a powerful signal that the Bank of Canada's rate hikes are having an impact," said Tu Nguyen, an economist with consultancy RSM

Maclean's. But even at seven per cent, the official inflation rate is still more than twice as high as the central bank likes to see. Which means consumers and borrowers should expect even more rate hikes to come.

"Grocery prices still rise rapidly and rapid wage growth means inflationary pressures remain [so] it is not yet time to breathe a total sigh of relief," Nguyen said.

Prince Edward Island resident Jennifer Cullen says inflation is nowhere near being under control for her family. She tries to save money any way she can, she said, and one way she's managed to stretch those pennies is by shopping at vintage and used clothing stores.

"My kids are very active and they grow very fast, so I'm changing shoes and clothes every two months with one of my boys," she told CBC News while browsing the aisles of Repats Clothing in Charlottetown.

Steve owner Mary Matthews says she's noticed an uptick in sales of late, as families stretch their budgets. And while higher sales may be good for her bottom line, her costs have increased too, as her inventory costs about twice what it did last year.

"It's hitting all of us," Matthews said. "Everything's costing more."

Military sounds alarm over recruiting problems as Canadians steer clear



Power Play: Replacing Canada's fighters

The Canadian Armed Forces is sounding the alarm over a severe shortage of recruits to fill thousands of vacant positions, with the shortfall so bad that senior officers are now calling it a crisis.

On a cool Tuesday afternoon, Robert Romero walks out of the Canadian Armed Forces' recruiting office in downtown Ottawa with an envelope full of papers in his hands.

Originally from the Philippines, Romero does not have any direct experience with Canada's military; his interest is largely derived from a sense of adventure and some of what he saw about soldiers in movies as a kid.

"I idolized them," he says. "I got hooked. So then I started researching about it and I got more into it."

Romero is one of 11 people who have just written an aptitude test to identify which military occupations prospective recruits are qualified to fill. He pulls his results from the envelope: intelligence officer, meteorological technician and cook.

He will now talk it over with his parents to decide which career interests him, whether he wants to write the test again or abandon the whole exercise.

Canada's military is supposed to be in a period of growth as new demands increase the need for trained soldiers, sailors and aviators. The Liberal government in 2017 laid out a plan to add thousands of full and part-time positions.

While the plan came after years of

troop shortages, there were signs the military was turning a corner as recruitment began to outpace departures.

"We were just starting to gain momentum when the pandemic hit," says Brig.-Gen. Krista Brodie, who is responsible for overseeing military recruitment and training.

Recruitment cratered during the first year of COVID-19 as the military shuttered recruiting and training centres. The result: only 2,000 people were enrolled in 2020-21 - less than half of what was needed.

Nearly 4,800 recruits were enrolled the following fiscal year as lockdowns and restrictions were eased.

But Brodie says the military is getting about half the number of applicants it needs per month to meet the goal of adding 5,900 members this year.

The shortfall is expected to exacerbate the current personnel shortage, with about one in 10 of the military's 100,000 positions unfilled.

"We are without a doubt in an applicant crisis right now," Brodie says.

Many industries are facing labour challenges, and Statistics Canada reported record job vacancies in June. But the pandemic and labour shortage have coincided with what Brodie describes as a "cultural reckoning" for the military.

That has been marked by allegations of misconduct against top officers and concerns about a growing disconnect between the military's makeup and Canadian society as a

whole, leading to a push for greater diversity in the ranks.

Those efforts include targeted recruiting of under-represented groups, including women and Indigenous people, and broader moves to create a more inclusive workplace by easing dress rules, which Brodie suggests are bearing fruit.

Still, fewer Canadians are opting for a military career and it is not fully clear why.

"I don't think we've got a good answer anywhere. I think there are so many factors and components and dimensions of the why," Brodie says.

The Defence Department is trying to better understand the problem, she added. It is also looking at possible solutions such as financial incentives, ways to improve work-life balance, and addressing public perceptions of the military.

Brodie was unable to say whether the push for diversity is hurting more than helping, at least in terms of their numbers, by turning off of the military's traditional recruiting pool: young, white men.

"We can't measure the impact of that right now. It's too early," she said. "But to be very, very clear - we want suitable candidates, and suitable candidates are those that first and foremost reflect the values of the Canadian Armed Forces."

The impact of not having enough new recruits is both short- and long-term, putting additional pressure on current members and meaning there are fewer people who can rise through the ranks and fill leadership

roles later.

The shortfall isn't uniform across the military. Certain occupations have more than enough applicants. But some are facing such severe shortages that signing bonuses of up to \$20,000 are being offered in 25 of the military's approximately 100 trades, including cook, meteorological technician and many more jobs.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Andrew Clark is senior recruiter in Ottawa. In recent weeks, his staff have been at different events such as the Outinam Airshow and a comic book convention to make their pitch.

"We're selling the benefits of being in the Canadian Armed Forces," he says. "The pension, the medical, the dental, the education piece, continuing education, as well as a pretty interesting career where you get to travel around the world, potentially, and get paid to do it."

Recruiters are given targets to meet, with spots divided up by trade, as well as minimum targets for female recruits and maximums for men.

There is also a high-level push for what the military still refers to as "visible minorities" and Indigenous people.

"Diversity is what we're after," Clark says.

Ottawa is unusual in that it is close to meeting its recruiting target, which Clark attributes to the large number of military families in the capital. But many other places are not, including traditional military communities.

"We're really seeing even places like Kingston that used to have a huge population of applicants, we're seeing the wick drying out," says Maj. Simon Rochelleau, who is responsible for managing recruiting efforts across northern and eastern Ontario.

Rochelleau has a number of theories to explain the situation, including the state of the economy, the lack of a major mission like Afghanistan to drive awareness, and concerns about sexual misconduct.

Outside the Ottawa recruiting centre, Jeremy Langlois has just finished the aptitude test. The 21-year-old chef wants to fly jets, but didn't score high enough. He will take the test again in 30 days in the hopes of qualifying.

"If that doesn't work out, well, then I'll have to re-evaluate and think about stuff," he says.

Priced out of Toronto's housing market? Alberta wants you to turn your eyes west

If you've been priced out of Toronto's real estate market, Alberta has its latest play will have you looking west to achieve your white-picket-fence dreams.

In a move to lure fed-up prospective home buyers, the province has unveiled the second phase of its campaign dubbed "Alberta is Calling."

"We've got Canada's lowest taxes and the lowest cost of living, plus the highest wages and incomes and lots of big opportunity," Alberta Premier Jason Kenney said in a video on Twitter.

The campaign touts slightly higher weekly earnings in Alberta over those in Ontario, averaging \$1,245 to \$1,186, respectively.

While the average income is comparable, there's a significant difference when it comes to real estate. According to Kenney, the average cost for a detached home is \$490,000

in Edmonton and \$700,000 in Calgary - in Toronto it's \$1.4 million.

In return for the "many cost-of-living, career and lifestyle advantages of life in Alberta," the province hopes people like Chahhan will fill some of its 100,000 job vacancies - a shortage it says is restricting 78 per cent of Alberta businesses from meeting demand.

Despite that shortage, the province says it has still seen the largest employment growth in the country so far in 2022. Between December 2021 and August 2022, employment in Alberta increased by 61,700 compared with an increase of 28,600 in Ontario, despite having a larger population.

But some experts say finding work in lesser populated cities like Calgary and Edmonton isn't so simple.

"Some of the other factors that are much bigger than the housing costs are job opportunities," said Rotman School of Management professor emeritus Anil Verma.

Verma argues that Alberta's
